A Letter from the Manse

Dear Friends

I really like the idea behind the meditation by Henry Van Dyke called 'Keeping Christmas'. It goes like this:

'It is a good thing to observe Christmas day. The mere marking of times and seasons, when men agree to stop work and make merry together, is a wise and wholesome custom. It helps one to feel the supremacy of the common life over the individual life. It reminds a man to set his own little watch, now and then, by the great clock of humanity which runs on sun time.

But there is a better thing than the observance of Christmas day, and that is, keeping Christmas.

Are you willing to forget what you have done for other people, and to remember what other people have done for you; to ignore what the world owes you, and to think what you owe the world; to put your rights in the background, and your duties in the middle distance, and your chances to do a little more than your duty in the foreground; to see that your fellow-men are just as real as you are, and try to look behind their faces to their hearts, hungry for joy; to own that probably the only good reason for your existence is not what you are going to get out of life, but what you are going to give to life; to close your book of complaints against the management of the universe, and look around you for a place where you can sow a few seeds of happiness—are you willing to do these things even for a day?

Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing to stoop down and consider the needs and the desires of little children; to remember the weakness and loneliness of people who are growing old; to stop asking how much your friends love you, and ask yourself whether you love them enough; to bear in mind the things that other people have to bear on their hearts; to try to understand what those who live in the same house with you really want, without waiting for them to tell you; to trim your lamp so that it will give more light and less smoke, and to carry it in front so that your shadow will fall behind you; to make a grave for your ugly thoughts, and a garden for your kindly feelings, with the gate open—are you willing to do these things even for a day?

Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world—stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death — and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem nineteen hundred years ago is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love?

Then you can keep Christmas.

And if you keep it for a day, why not always? But you can never keep it alone.'

Will you 'Keep Christmas' this year?



Small Team... Big Hearts!




We are blessed with a small yet wonderfully dedicated group of volunteers who faithfully wear many hats within our church family.


















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Brighton & Hove Circuit at 3Generate

Tell Out My Soul



When *Hymns & Psalms* was published in 1988 it was the first time that hymns for Advent & Christmas were given their own sections in our hymn book, whereas before they had always been listed in the same section.

This presented the opportunity to include a lot of new hymns in the Advent section. One of these new hymns was "Tell out my soul, the greatness of the Lord" by Timothy Dudley-Smith (1926-2024) an Anglican Bishop and hymnwriter. Eight other of his hymns were also included in *Hymns & Psalms*.

Timothy Dudley-Smith wrote the hymn in May 1961 when he and his wife had just moved into their first house in Blackheath. He was inspired to write the text when reading a modern paraphrase of the Magnificat in Luke 1: 46-55 in the New English Bible. It first appeared in *The Anglican Hymn Book* (1965) and since has been included in nearly every hymn book in the English-speaking world.

Dudley-Smith was born on 26 December 1926 in Manchester, England, to Phyllis and Arthur Smith. His father was a schoolteacher in Derbyshire who instilled in Dudley-Smith a love for poetry. Arthur fell ill and died when Dudley-Smith was eleven years old and shortly thereafter, he desired to be a minister. He was educated at Tonbridge School before studying maths and then theology at Pembroke College, Cambridge. After graduating in 1947, he began his ordination training at Ridley Hall, Cambridge. He was ordained deacon in 1950 and priest in 1951.


After some years in Kent, he worked for the Church Pastoral Aid Society and in 1973 was appointed as Archdeacon of Norwich and as Bishop of Thetford from 1981 to 1991. He also served as president of the Evangelical Alliance from 1987 to 1992.

It was while serving with the Church Pastoral Society that he started writing hymns and he went on to write around 400 hymns. He became a member and honorary vice-president of the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland; he was also awarded fellowships from the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada and the Royal School of Church Music. In 2003, he was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire "for services to hymnody". In July 2009 he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree by Durham University.

When published in *The Anglican Hymn Book* (1965), "Tell Out, My Soul" was set to the tune TIDINGS by William Llewellyn. In 1966, the hymn was included in *Youth Praise*, set to a tune by Michael Baughen, Go Forth. The text was later paired with an existing hymn tune Woodlands in 1969. It was composed by Walter Greatorix (1877-1949) in 1916, and first published in the *Public School Hymnbook* (1919) and set to the hymn "Lift up your hearts". This also appeared in the *Methodist Hymn Book* (1933). The tune was named after one of the school houses at Gresham's School, Holt, Norfolk, where the composer was director of music. It is this tune that it is most widely sung to and has always been the one in our hymn books.

In the 2013 survey, "The UK's Top 100 Hymns" conducted by BBC's Songs of Praise, "Tell Out, My Soul" was voted joint 51st along-side "Nearer My God, to Thee", "Lord, Jesus Christ" ("Living Lord") and "Give Me Joy in My Heart". In December 2018 I led one of our "Q" evening services on Advent Hymns and asked the congregation to vote which was their favourite and "Tell Out My Soul" was the overwhelming winner.

busy with. She delivered it and got paid. Then she went shopping and got flour, dried fruits and spices to make the special Christmas biscuits. Then she went to the other end of the market to choose some decorations. While she was wandering through the crowds a pickpocket stole her purse. She was devastated as now she could not get any decorations. How disappointed the children would be. She went home but did not say anything to the children. They had brought the tree indoors and polished the leaves and were very excited. They went to bed. She made the biscuits - they turned out nice. Then she went to bed.

While she was asleep the spider slowly spun a rope and came down to the tree, she continued to spin her gossamer and went all around the tree, her young spiders joined her and they all spun the most wonderful gossamer all over the tree. In the morning they all got up and there was the tree, beautifully adorned and glistening.

This should be the end of the story, but when Christmas was over the mother carefully unwound the gossamer - which was very strong - and wound it round an empty spool. When she did some sewing she sewed a motif on the garment with the spiders thread so that it glistened in the light. This proved very successful and more and more people asked her to sew especially for them. Over time she became quite well-off with her sewing skills.

We now decorate our Christmas tree with tinsel which glistens in the light; but is it ever quite a beautiful as the spiders fine gossamer?

Smarties Cake... A Family Favourite!

1/4 pint (150ml) milk 2oz (50g) caster sugar 1oz (25g) cocoa powder 3oz (75g) caster sugar (2) 3oz (75g) margarine

302 (73g) margarine

1 egg 5oz (150g) self-raising flour

2 x 6-7" (15-18cm) Cake Tins, lined Oven 190° C (gas 5)

- 1. Warm milk, sugar and cocoa together in a saucepan until sugar dissolves then bring to the boil-stirring. This must boil to cook the cocoa. Leave to cool.
- 2. In a bowl cream together caster sugar (2) and margarine then beat in egg. Mix in the chocolate mixture alternately with the flour.
- 3. Pour into prepared tins Cook for 30 minutes or until firm and shrinking from the edges. If using one deep tin allow about an hour in the oven.
- 4. Sandwich together with chocolate fudge icing and decorate the top with Smarties.

Chocolate fudge icing: 2oz (50g) butter or margarine, 8oz (225g) icing sugar (sieved), 3 tablespoons milk. Place ingredients in heat-resistant bowl over a pan of gently steaming water with 2 tablespoons sieved cocoa plus a few drops of vanilla essence. Remove from heat allow to cool until thickens to a spreading consistency. This can be used as a filling as well as an icing.

Decorate even for Christmas!


